Water Safety and Attainment Data 2020 – 2021

Our ability to collect pupil data for swimming and water safety was interrupted by the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak. Usually we would report on the competency of our Year 6 pupils with regards to certain swimming expectations:

To:

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- perform a safe self-rescue in different water based situations
- use a range of strokes effectively

However, due to the pandemic, swimming opportunities were limited for our Year 6 pupils. Due to swimming pools being closed for a long period, we were only able to facilitate two sessions in the summer term. This was insufficient to assess the children accurately. As a result, no data is available for 2020-21. Data for 2021-22 will be available providing that the current Year 6 cohort is able to participate in a full block of swimming this academic year. We have planned this for the autumn of 2021 to avoid any further disruption due to the pandemic.
